18	Impressions about IPS career	If performed honestly, diligently and impartially, it is a very noble & mentally rewarding service and can be counted as one of the best services but if any of these good traits is missing, then it is a deplorable career.
19	Fond memories of the service	Having been placed in command of the only Range in the State as also the HAP & Wireless at the same time (from 1972-1975) – the only other DIG in the State being the DIG/CID – it was very taxing but satisfying and complimentary. The tenure as AIG/GRP from 2.11.1966 to 23.6.1971 was also very satisfying to him. As IGP of the State, he had protested about the promotion of an SP as a DIG on account of his having selected some undeserving Constables in an exam for B-1 list, by remarking their papers favourably. His protest cost him the DG's post but

		<p>elates him because subsequently he got the most coveted Police Medal – President’s Police Medal for Distinguished Services- without his requesting for it even - God’s Grace !</p> <p>He feels happy and elated by his refusal to send an ASI for Upper School course despite the then IGP’s firm request which he fulfilled after securing three more seats for the senior ASIs also deserving to be sent.</p> <p>He feels elated in recalling the appreciation shown to his service by the present DGP, Sh. R.S. Dalal, 15 years after his retirement, in an article “Call of Duty” in the Hindustan Times dated 17.9.99 in which he was described as the epitome of simplicity, integrity and total commitment to duty. He had told Sh. Dalal when he held the first charge of a district Superintendent of Police that cops have to be tough and gritty. An officer has to be prepared to make personal sacrifices when the call of duty beckons. That’s what he called an officer-like conduct.</p>
20	Advice to members of IPS	<p>This coveted Service, if performed honestly and conscientiously, can be very satisfying and rewarding mentally because ‘Service of man is service of God’. He has rewarded him fully by promoting him to the highest post, giving him the highest medal and by rewarding him with full mental satisfaction and consequent peace of mind, despite the fact that he had never been ‘ A politicians’ man’ with the result that in his thirty five years’ service, he had been transferred thirty five times. In promotions in the force, at lower levels, he ensured justice by holding exams, wherever required, very honestly and handing over the papers to candidates for their satisfaction/correction before announcing the result on the spot and he never kept any marks for interviews because that is where the results are expected to be tampered with by ‘sifarish’. One should look after the force as his family honestly and give no quarters to the undeserving if they fail to achieve corrections. Personal ambitions should not stand in the way of dispensing justice to the force and the public-it is a must.</p>
